COME ONE, COME ALL TO SHOWCASE SCHENECTADY 2002

Showcase Schenectady 2002, the Schenectady County Chamber of Commerce's annual trade show that will feature a hospitality workshop by I LOVE NY, will be held from 2 to 7 p.m. Thursday, April 25 at the Ramada Inn and Convention Center, 450 Nott St., Schenectady. The annual exhibit of Schenectady County businesses will include a free business after-hours mixer and prizes for attendees.

There remain openings for exhibitors, though spaces are going quickly. This year's show can accommodate about 50 exhibitors. The Gazette Newspapers, publishers of the *Daily* and *Sunday Gazette*, has signed on as media sponsor for the event. Corporate sponsorships are also being accepted.

"This year's Showcase Schenectady will truly be a 'one-stop shop' for Chamber members, the public, business owners, organizations and anyone interested in seeing how they can benefit from being a member of the Schenectady County Chamber of Commerce," says Chamber President Charles Steiner. "We'll have it all, from displays by members of the county's thriving business and organization community, to a speaker from the state Tourism Division, to an after-hours mixer where everyone will be able to mingle and conduct business in a casual, fun atmosphere."

"We're truly lucky to have the I LOVE NY campaign holding a workshop during the showcase," says Robin Granger, chamber promotion and events manager, who works closely with the state Division of Tourism to conduct promotional campaigns on behalf of Schenectady County. Granger, the designated tourism promotion agent for Schenectady County, notes that Susan Saba will conduct a 90-minute workshop, beginning at 2:30 p.m. that day, to show attendees how they might influence more tourists to consider Schenectady County and city when choosing their next travel destination.

KINGSWAY KIDS CENTER IS REACCREDITED

KingsWay Kids Center at 357 Kings Road, Schenectady has been re-accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC).

NAEYC accreditation is a rigorous, voluntary process in which early childhood programs demonstrate that they meet national standards of excellence. The program was developed in response to the growing number of American children spending large amounts of time in groups away from home.

"The heart of NAEYC accreditation focuses on the child's experience," notes center director Lisa Stoler. The review focuses on health and safety,

staffing, staff qualifications and physical environment. "Children's language and social skills specifically benefit from better quality found in NAEYC-accredited programs," says Stoler.

The center serves about 60 children ranging in age from two months to five years old. Breakfast, lunch and two snacks are provided, as well as social and educational programs. Activities include painting, music and singing, art, story time, indoor and outdoor play areas, computers, cooking and outings. There also are special programs that allow the children to visit residents of the nearby KingsWay Manor Assisted Living and KingsWay Arms Nursing Center facilities.

BNI HAS FUNDS FOR HOME PURCHASE AND REPAIR

Better Neighborhoods Inc. (BNI) has received a third round of funding to administer the Homebuyer Acquisition and Renovation Program (HARP-3) that helps eligible homebuyers purchase and repair one- and two-family homes in Schenectady neighborhoods.

The \$323,290 is from the New York State Housing Trust Fund Corporation and the state Division of Housing and Community Renewal.

BNI first offered HARP in 1999, and has renovated 14 housing units in 10 homes since that time. HARP-3 is for first-time buyers purchasing an eligible property within all or portions of the Mont Pleasant, Central State Street, Eastern Avenue, Vale, Hamilton Hill, Downtown and Seward Place neighborhoods. BNI also assists buyers of two-family homes throughout Schenectady through its HARP-2 phase. Call BNI at (518) 372-6469 for details.

Buyers must earn less than 70 per-

cent of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development designated median area income for the Capital District. For a family of four, that equals an annual household income of \$38,850 or less.

Buyers must apply for participation before purchasing a home, complete BNI's homebuyer education curriculum and be confirmed as eligible for help. BNI staff assists applicants with selecting suitable homes so the project can be deemed financially feasible.

BNI will help buyers obtain bank financing and, once ownership is transferred, manage the repair work, with the assistance secured by a second mortgage held by BNI. The interest-free mortgage requires no monthly payments unless the owner sells or moves during the term of the mortgage. Up to \$25,000 is available for single-family homes and up to \$40,000 for two-unit buildings.

ST. CLARE'S HOSTS GOLF, TENNIS TOURNAMENT

The 11th annual St. Clare's Hospital Golf & Tennis Classic will be held Monday, June 10 at Mohawk Golf Club, Schenectady. Organizers are initiating a morning shotgun start to the golf portion to accommodate the traditionally sold-out event.

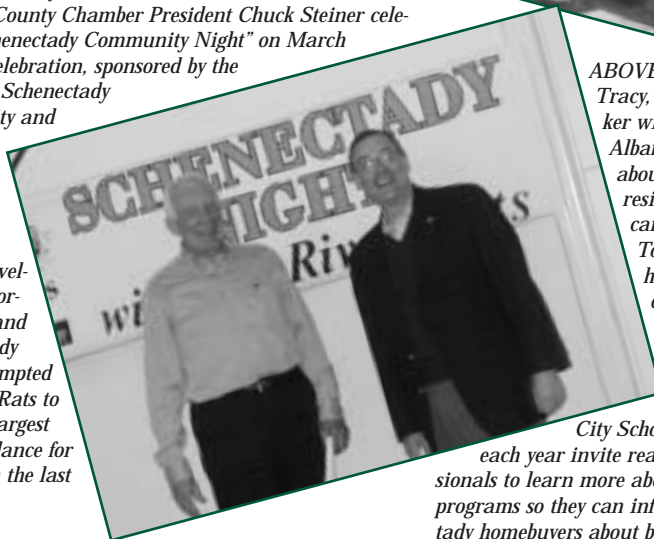

GIRLS INC. AND SCHENECTADY YWCA GET GRANTS

The Women's Interest Network (WIN), an employee resource group at Fleet, has made \$2,500 grants to each of Girls Incorporated of the Greater Capital District and the Schenectady YWCA.

Girls Inc. will use the money to support its financial literacy program, "She's on the Money," that teaches girls the skills related to money management and planning. Girls learn how to budget, save, take informed financial risks and avoid feeling intimidated about money. Volunteer mentors and Girls Inc. staff also teach financial independence skills.

The grant will benefit the "exit basket" program of Schenectady YWCA's domestic violence shelter, in which clients leaving the shelter are given baskets with items designed to ease the transition to independent living. Items include bus tokens, stamps, address books, cleaning supplies and telephone cards.

TRANSFINDER RELEASES NEW PRODUCT

Schenectady based Transfinder, a transportation management software company, has released its new, innovative product, *Transfinder i*, an Internet solution that allows school district employees and parents to quickly access transportation-related information.

Transfinder i allows parents to know where their child will be picked up by bus, locate the school their child would attend if they are relocating, and visualizes the route their child's bus will follow to school. The service displays the school district's transportation data on the district's Web site so members of the community and parents can access the information rather than call the school district. Parents can request information or send questions to the school administration via e-mail.

IBM DONATES \$1 MILLION TO UNION COLLEGE

Union College is receiving \$1 million worth of technical support from IBM that is to help undergraduates gain access to leading-edge technology across a wide array of courses held at the historic Schenectady campus.

College President Roger Hull calls the support "a sign of recognition for Union's unique liberal arts and engineering tradition reflecting an interdisciplinary approach to education."

IBM will assist Union College by providing software access, software development, visiting faculty and a variety of sophisticated equipment, including an atomic force microscope for a nanotechnology materials lab and several high-powered computer workstations. Union also gains access to an IBM supercomputer at the University at Albany.

The program "is aimed at our undergraduate community" adds Hull. "It builds on our groundbreaking 'converging technologies' program and makes it possible for a larger number of undergraduates to gain classroom and laboratory experience that exposes them to, and teaches them about, the impact of technology across multiple disciplines."

John E. Kelly III, senior vice president and group executive of IBM Technology Group, says the support is part of IBM's ongoing desire to enhance a strong technical presence at select leading colleges and universities. "This is an investment in the future of the college, the Capital District and New York state," he says. The partnership with Union will further promote the sharing of technical knowledge and formation of joint programs between RPI in Troy and UAlbany.
